A, I think relatively well, known for great work in the Melbourne, LGBTI community as a social worker and is now written a book, which is going to tell us about welcome Tracy Whitmore to 3 CR.

Thanks so much Sally, it's all awesome to have you with us a couple of things. First you're you're sitting there I can while I mean I can obviously see the zoom screen but you're sitting there in a wonderful Pride scuff you've just been to a pride event because it is pride month and of course you get to go out and do it in the summer solstice warmth of the northern hemisphere. Do tell us a little about the pride event because we can all we can always hear about Pride events. Yeah yeah I do get to do it in the summer solstice time.

Was which is fantastic. It's been a beautiful day today. Sorry. For those of you in Melbourne it's been, it's been beautiful. So we had will be had actually two Pride events this weekend so one last night which was a Gala to, to celebrate a woman who is a fantastic activist and has been for most of the 80 years of her life and also to raise money to help bring a refugee family queer family.

The to Canada to to safety, which was pretty fantastic to attend that, with a whole bunch of Korea. We are artists and people doing all sorts of fun things last night. And then today was in the park. So, lots of stalls and music and drag queen entertainment and loads and loads of fun. A sunshine. Well, that's what we like to you. But, you know, our turn will come.

Six months from Melbourne will be blatantly will be freezing when it does. Well, that's right and we'll be going on guys. I hope it's not going to be 40 degrees on Pride March like it was in 2018. We still haven't forgotten that and that's 40 cents Celsius. Not 40 Fahrenheit. Hmm. But you know, we it's great and I look I think it is always awesome to hear of Pride events. I just you know I think we need are always need every will say dos their of of queer pride and

And also, I just want to say and I think that's really awesome that, you know, of the intersectionality, they're helping a queer Refugee family, working with to assist a queer Refugee family, that's now greater awareness of privilege and and, you know, sort of intersectionality. So, you know, I think that's really cool. What a great way to start the show and now it's going to get better because we want to talk about the fact that you have written a book called. It's about you too. Let's start.

Start by saying what made you write any book? And then I'll say, particularly this one, let's dive in there. What's a book? Because writing a book come. It's not just something. You know, you just I'll take a day off day off my day job and write a book about it.

Yeah, yeah. I mean it's the idea of writing a book has been a few years in the making the content of the book has changed slightly over those years. And yeah I I think I just felt like it was the best way to get the information to more people so that because I'm only one person so I can't talk to everybody in the world though. I'm

Into talking to as many as possible. So that was that was what drove me to to write a book. Was to really get the information that I included in the book out to more people work. It more accessible. Well, that's that's a fair thought. I mean you can't talk to one person but hopefully, potentially we can reach. Well, I'd love it. If we reached 8 billion people today but we can really stretch some of them through the power of the radio waves and our podcast.

Repeat and on-demand thereafter and now we we need every bit of information. I mean, some of us didn't quit communities. We kind of feel like maybe we've heard it before. But there's always, of course, a family where someone will come out as queer. Particularly and will drill a little more towards the emphasis of your book where the person disclosing something, and you've only covered gender identity and sexual romantic orientation in this book.

So, and I think that's a reasonable thing because variation of sex characteristics is a different can have its differences compared to those attributes. You've spoken, stoneware younger people come out, which gives us a chance to give the again the title of the book and what made you decide to write about that particular area of all the things you've done?

Yes. So I mean the book is for parents of her parent of Igbtqia+. People generally regardless of their age but it does focus in a little bit more where parents are actually still doing the parenting. And like you mentioned, I don't I don't focus in so much on intersex and that is because it is quite quite a different experience and often parents will already know

Information. So it's not as much about coming out or finding out this new information and being overwhelmed. I think they're overwhelm is probably a lot earlier and before the child often even knows themselves. So it's a different conversation. So I definitely work in that space But I didn't Focus the book as much on those things. Do I feel like it will definitely benefit. Well I've been told it will benefit any parents regardless of their child.

Bob's sexuality, or gender, identity, or, or anything else? So, the pet will, the reason behind this was I worked for many, many years supporting young people. So tend to 25 year olds, which then led me to working with parents, as well as supporting parents. And, you know, there's there's been for a very long time, a huge gap in that support in the professional space and I know now there's a lot more people

Support groups, which is fantastic because I think that peer support is really important and that connection and having having people that have a similar experience or end or understanding of people's experiences. But the reason why I chose to write this book was because I was hearing more and more often from parents that they were being told that it's not about you. So when they were seeking out,

Support. And this is parents that are mostly wanting to be supportive, not their child. Just don't know how don't know where to start scared of saying or doing the wrong thing worried about whether or not you know, if they support their child, is that going to be harmful for their child and all of those things. And so what these parents were coming to me and saying, was, there were being told from all avenues that it's not about you, it's about your child. You need to put your feelings aside.

And just support your child and whilst I agree with part of that, it is important for the parent to support their child and focus on their child, and it is about their child. The other reality is that people can't put their feelings aside, especially when it comes to your child. And so, that's not a realistic expectation. And a lot of those parents were kind of shutting down, then not seeking support scared too.

To to explore and ask questions, which is more harmful to their job, because they then can't get the education, the information that they need. And they also struggle to process their own feelings and, and, you know, where their thoughts and values and beliefs are coming from. So that's what drove me to to write this and it's where the title come from from. It's about you, too. So, it is about you too. Yep.

And that's, that's where. So the two is really important, there it is about your child and it's about you and it's, you need to do the work. Yeah. Look Lots in there, just to reiterate that, I mean you can't, I don't believe it invalidating, anyone's feelings. I mean, that's for that can be very hard.

I'm just going beyond our Tusk topic of discussion for a second where the views might appear. And I hate binary is very opposite to your own.

And it can be very hard to put yourself in someone else's position if the feelings seem different, but we're not talking something that hard here and it can and I share my experience as a facilitator of the group trance, family for loved ones of trans and gender diverse people. Now, this brings lots of bells me, parents turn up, it's all a bit left field and perhaps even more. So for that where their child is, identifying beyond the binary and that can be a bit of an extra,

Challenge. It's while I mean, I thought it was man, but in very bad language for a second man, becoming woman woman to coming man. What's this sort of something else again? And those feelings are valid. And I've seen this time, and again, at the trans family meetings, where someone's very quiet, they pluck up the courage to speak and it's just, you can always, you can see one or two people nudging the boxes of tissues towards them. And then finally, it's like they open up and it's all gosh. There's someone else like that. And they've been through this for years ago.

Go and the relief is there. And we need support for a Journeys in the loved one's Journey parents, or anyone else. Grandparents, and siblings. Siblings is all valid, and there needs to be a space for them. And I say, yeah, I'm with you on that and there'd be, there would be some trans people in particular who might disagree with me on what I've just said, but they have a right to their space. And then the thing that I was going to say is that I use the analogy. A lot of batteries and battery cables, your child wants to plug into your batteries. Well,

If your battery is flat, it's not going to work. But if you're keeping your battery charged and charging at more than that, kids going to sort of, in this case, it's going to go into Top Gear a lot more quickly. Yeah. In a very safe fuel efficient way as well. So I think it's really, really important that we give parents the space. And, you know, you've done that in in this, in this wonderful book, you know, sort of, it's about you to reducing the overwhelm for

It's of Igbtq+ kids and there's a couple of things that I like first, the first one that I there's a good range of I LG and B and then within the t-there's binary and non-binary and everything else that month that obviously is important, but I'd still want to get your your own words on that as to how important that was when you share that when you've shared those stories.

Yeah, yeah. I mean, of course, it's very important to cover everybody stories, and I think I've done. I've think I've done it a little bit in that covering covering each person stories it was tricky, trying to put together stories to try and cover the different. The differ, like, obviously the different gender identities and sexualities, but also the different experiences on the

Levels. So I tried to include where where, you know a partner is not being included in the information sharing. So a child comes out to to one parent and not the other parent or the partner of of that parent. And so there are other experiences as well so that people would, you know, where the was married included or babies being.

Being conceived and you know all the different and developments to people's lives. So and also trying to make sure that I protected people's confidentiality. So some stories that I was going to share that. I decided not to was a little bit because

Their stories were quite unique in some ways and I was concerned about protecting their their confidentiality. So, yeah, but definitely very important. And from what I'm hearing so far from

people who have who have read, they're able to pull out little elements from the stories where they can connect. Maybe the whole story doesn't sound like there's but, but different elements orbitals, which is was my goal, which is great. Yeah.

Well, that's the thing, there's always it could but it's often can be that one snippet, the small is a speck of gold that comes to the surface and that shines through so to speak and gives everyone that OMG light bulb, 24-karat moment. So to speak, where they can go on to a better road, which I think is really important and it's in one sense. Therefore, the book is packed with information and stories. The other part I am think is really, really awesome myself.

Elf is that you've got these sort of grounding tips at the end of each chapter, you know, which is takes another approach because we all know that different people respond to different forms of communication and parts of the brain and you've taken that approach. Tell us a bit more about that bit because that does that just struck me as yeah, really cool. Yeah. Well my focus is in. All of the work that I do is around self care and being kind to yourself. So, I really wanted to make sure that

You know, this actions in there that are more practical in relation to engaging with your child. And then there's what I call terms of mops moments of pores, which are many mindfulness practices where people can just come the nervous system basically so that they can be better place to take in the information. That's that's in the book and try and take care of themselves, a little bit more, and I do want to say in relation to that and

Your last question, the intent of this book. When I started writing, it was going to be the book is going to be between 100 and 150 Pages. Mmm, that was the hope that was the the aim it's turned out to about 280. I think that's right. Yeah. I just kept writing and writing and writing to include everybody and everything but I had to stop somewhere. Well, that's the thing. I mean, this is, I'm, I've never written a book. I mean, it's somewhere

In somewhere, in middle in personal interest to break away for a second, in my bucket list, it's about getting the time and the having the money to do it it would be. And I mean this this specific thing would be about what. But, you know, the thing that I do when I do listen to other writers of any sort fiction nonfiction? Is it can you know to quoted the name of an ed Cooper? Banned from the IDS? The yard goes on forever and you do sort of end up feeling like you could write forever. So.

It's you know, it's a challenging thing which just brings us back to the process of the book in terms of editing and Publishing how how and who and how so to speak there, you know, who helped you out there? And how did you find them? And how did that all go? That's sort of. Yeah, so, it's interesting. You mention, you mentioned budget, what? As one of the things when you're wanting to write, it's having the money to do so, as well, because it can be an extremely expensive process, which I didn't have

Budget. But I also didn't want that to get in the way of this book getting out there. So I've been very, very lucky to have a couple of people edit or me who? So, one person, you know, Suzanne for Elsa. Oh please, she was one of my editors and what my aunt aunt, I actually was a psychologist. So her name's Jane Whitmore. And

And so, I had I edited myself which I'm not very good at editing, my own work, I can edit other people's put on my own, but I hear that most people are like that. So, I went through the first

editing round, then gave it to Jane, and she put her her academic and psychology lens over it, and then I reviewed that then gave it to Suzanne and she put her intellectual and her

To BT Q IO + lens over over it as well. And her and I have worked quite closely together for many years so she knows my work as well. Yeah, so she was able to to do that side of it and then proofreading where, you know, 2023 there's plenty of software out there that does that for you, that it's not 100% accurate. So I had to go over and over that several times which has been a long. I think, I think I took

Just as long at acting and proofreading as I did writing the book itself and then I'm self-publishing which has been an exciting and interesting process as well. There's been a great learning process on every angle. Yep. I'll look. Absolutely. So and sort of from wall safe before we go to a comment from a listener. From the time you sort of well, I'll say first wrote.

Thing. Yeah, and you're obviously would have had notes in your head for years, but from the time, we really decided to sit down to the time. Whereas as of today that the we can announce that it is all fully published. It is yes and yep. Currently on Amazon and will be in bookstores. Hopefully the wonderful hit. I'm sure the 14 has known as hello Roland if your listing will want to get a copy of this. Yeah, hopefully eyes.

So how long did it all take I'm just I'm just a bit curious house.

Yes, so from from sitting down brainstorming content and mapping out what was going to go in this book and what's going to go into another one? Hahaha was August last year, so it's that 10 10 11 months from from sitting down and having paper spread all over my office for two now, I guess it'll 11 months and probably an accurate. Yeah, well look I I can see your

Now it's looking very tidy and also see people of color rainbow flag in the background as well as also a very nice thing as well. So yeah. Well that's pretty pretty reasonable for a 280 290 page book that it all just came flying out. I must have been on just totally sort of well a bit not quite what's apropos of something. I'm trying to read the book Bird by bird about how to write at the moment. My keep

Eating other books, keep good books, like, yours that I need to read, keep coming along, but I think that, you know, those sorts of things that help people write and write something and write steadily, I think of the go as well, whether it's sort of fiction, nonfiction advice, personal event, whatever it is. Yes how I found, you know, minimum of an hour a day was how I got through that call because once you get going sometimes, you'll if you've got the time you'll just keep

Me. But if you think that if you try and sit down for three or four hours, you know, two days a week or so, that's it feels like too big a job and then you just don't sit down and Cafe is a great for me. Anyway, I like to go sit in the café and right and I could treat myself for coffee to a latte and I look, you're still a true melburnian it, huh? Yeah, I am and Vancouver. Now makes pretty good lattes, which is fantastic for the first time I

I came here, they didn't. That's what we like to hear. Well, I look, I haven't I'm going to digress again. I have a bit of a soft spot for Canada by having been there many years ago in 1994, I felt it was a lovely country that had the best of so many things nature, friendliness history, and a range of stuff to see, and oh, well, good food and good range of beer in my opinion, as well. That's also important for the evening local breweries.

Yes what? And now I'd better not mention a particular brand but there's one brand I think that should be imported into. Well, talking categories is just as well, you didn't have a cat because you know, they would have they would have mucked it up, the cat would have marked it up. Oh yeah yeah I was going to ask something else can and this is a very apropos of nothing and it's sad that it's come to me and I'm you don't have to answer this. It's nothing to do with writing the book. I

Or on the North American continent. Yes, in Canada, which overall and Igbtqa+ has a pretty good record but you are next door to the USA, where we know, there is just so much difficult stuff going on being closer to it. I thought, you know, and this is you can just totally your subjective. Thoughts, you know, what are your thoughts and feelings on what is going on in the country next door to where you now live?

It's heartbreaking. Yeah, in a word. It is absolutely heartbreaking. I assume we hear a lot more here than than what you're hearing there. And I have a lot of contacts in the US as well from, from the queer community and parents and family members. And I mean, obviously some states are a lot worse than others, but it's, yeah. It's, and because this is the work.

That I do. So it's all over my social media. Social media. Yeah. Like I have to be on my social media a lot. So it's it is really, really difficult. There are some, some uplifting stories coming through like in some of the worst states. There there are a few like I think it was Florida a judge has has

Going against some of the bands that were being put forward for interfering with trans health care and that kind of thing. But it's still pretty pretty awful. I don't know, I'm kind of don't have words for it's just. Yeah, devastating. Oh, look, you know, rest assured. I feel that the same and I think that, yeah, there was the news of a federal judge overturning, the Arkansas, law, Banning trans miners Transit Transit.

Minority Health Care during the week which was a glimmer of, you know, sort of a couple of those which is great. Yeah, sort of the sandbags are going to the flood so to speak but it's, you know, we're going to need. Unfortunately, and I need to pile up the sandbags for a bit and then, you know, turn it back and so it is pretty. Yeah, it is pretty awful. I mean, we get a steady flow of news here on it and again, obviously, someone myself just being a little self-indulgent in the Network's, we hear of it and

Just it is, it's my feeling is one of disbelief at the irrationality in the unkindness of it all know, the spin doctor, Dennis, but I think that, you know, just, I don't know. It feels like we're, the mobilization is pushing back here. There was actually a meeting of Victorian. Queer Advocates on how we can start pushing back proactively on Friday, which unfortunately, I was unable to attend and I'm sure that's spreading around this.

This big island and the surrounding smaller ones, very quickly and rainbow Community, angels has set itself up a Revival of something, from the early 2000s which is good, but, you know, it just seems the frustration. We know is, we know what we need to get done and it's not happening. So it's all that sort of thing. But thanks, thanks for letting us know. Because, you know, it can be sometimes, you know, you can read things in newspapers or whatever, queer all mainstream but it doesn't quite feel the same as hearing it from someone who's

Sighs yeah, yeah. I'd like to just say though to just on what you said, there is a lot of fantastic work going on as well. A lot of people doing a lot of advocacy and lot of optimism out there, and I think the disappointment, is that we're still having to do that and give so much of it and against such

I know what the word is. It's like it's just so overt and so disgusting, a lot of the behavior that's going on but but there is a lot of there was a relly protest at the front of a school which just like you said, like I'd it's just disbelief yeah and why people would do that but there was a protest going on around.

Against this. So G I think which is a program that's in schools, educating around sexuality and gender identity and but I hope but there was a whole bunch of people that created like a wall, a protection wall between the protesters and the school so it protected the kids. Yeah. From at least seeing that probably didn't. Well I think they made a lot of noise as well so the kids couldn't hear they kind of drowned out the the anti-soviet.

Protests, which is pretty fantastic. Yeah. Now just coming back to the messages before. We just checking if there's anything else we need to discuss? One of our recurring awesome listeners Kayleen has come in and said just affirmed what you said about. Well said by your guests about support and validation and she needed that for her parents in the 90s was one comment and I, yes, I've heard someone else, I'm Jenny who's a

Another of our awesome recurring listeners has said that I attended QA recently. Yes, I was in the audience for Q&A on ABC TV here on Monday night and you can look for the rainbow scarf and beanie because it was flapping freezing.
