Okay, we're a will say a social worker mental health type of work is said we've been focused reasonably enough on queer youth. But what about queer older people and I just know it's maybe it's something we haven't had to think about in queer communities because maybe not a lot of us got to be old, you know at all or we came out late and didn't have to think about things but what happens later in life the oh you've come out.

More settled. Yes, we're fortunate and I'm grateful that we live in somewhere like Victoria and to a large extent so-called Australia which are better places in the world to be and of course a lot of people in the world wouldn't be, you know fighting for survival on so many levels, but you think we treat our queer Elders. I'm going to start from a numerical point of view our middle and Senior cohort quiz well enough, but you think we treat respect truly respect.

What it's going on. It was interesting. One of the other wasn't so much it was in the timing of Idaho but week but I gave a talk and talked about some of the things that happened in olden days and people aren't aware of them doing, you know, we not documenting our history and therefore not understanding what queer middle and Senior cohort people who didn't have internet who went through different times where there was no less positive social attitudes.

All these factors. Are we understanding this? Are we training our you know, sort of middle and Senior cohort quiz, well enough what happens when you know, maybe you've need to take a break from activism. What do you do? I mean you can go and do transferable skills analyses, which is all very likewise get this part mixed up left-brain the so-called.

Maybe it's a personal one, but I do know of other older quiz who in my opinion who gave so much to our communities and have been well to put it politely dumped upon very poorly in my opinion and you know,

We trading a yes sort of people who give so much to our communities with respect and I'm just interested in to see if anyone has any thoughts on this or maybe you don't maybe you tapped in bed on the long weekend and don't want to think which is your freedom of choice and all that sort of thing. So welcome your thoughts on this do we have anti older people attitudes in queer communities? Is it different to the broader communities at the same bits of both non-binary?

No one is Left Behind and which perhaps was a factor in why I just mentioned the topic of older quiz, but sometimes people do feel left behind in pride month. It gets all a bit sort of sterile, perhaps formula rised. And so how do we bring people along now? We have we and how do we acknowledge differences? Not that there's anything wrong with difference of course difference is just

Just different it's neutral but we sat at said it before I'll say it again. We make different levels of progress in our communities and the evidence backs that 4G in rough ordered glbt. I I'm deliberately using that because obviously, you know, the reality is that there will be a cisgender man privilege. So how do we deal with all these issues? How do we make sure that you know panels are sort of inclusive?

If you've only got say I'm being very a little sort of generalized here. If you've only got say 30 to 50 year old gay men and lesbians on a panel. Are you missing discussion and of course acknowledging forms of privilege, you know white privilege where is the diversity? So I think it's really important that that happens during pride month and that we look at where we're at Stonewall. Of course.

Very important often seen as the birth of the modern in inverted commas Gay Liberation movement, but of course there were many many uprisings and right since there is it's very easy to find those in various articles on Wikipedia and whatnot for basic research purposes, but it is an important moment in our history and you know, it also gets me thinking about assimilation is MM, you know.

Are We Now 55 years on from Stonewall and now have we aspired to middle-class sort of thinking well, some people have their happy with that. But again don't leave anyone behind I suppose is an important theme and really important that we do sort of bring everyone along and not for everyone and what's going to bind us together on that. I suppose. No he's asked.

Slogans enough or do we need better values? It's an interesting point. Jenny has emailed in. Hello Jenny. Thanks for your message. Jenny's head.
