Don't think they'll be any content notes planned on the show today or that could come up but if so we'll do it on an as-needed basis.

And well I've been to get Jessi Ryan on the line. I can rhyme and it's not a crime very very soon to talk about the Midsummer show QRAVE with spelt with a Q queer rave, there's some queer thinking for you but in the meantime until I'm just having a couple of technical issues here and there or those sorts of things, communications issues to be precise.

The news of the week, of course, is that the Australian Bureau of Statistics for the firsttime released stats on the number of LGBTI Australians. And I think this is overall very good news. And what makes me say that is that while the figure overall may seem lower than what some people were expecting for a long time we've had the one in ten approach. I think when we look into it very a little more with a little more depth will find that we are close to that.

Now what do I mean by all that, what that's the question is that the stats revealed that 4.9 percent of Australians, overall identify a 4.5%. I beg your pardon. I can once more of slightly rhyming situation, 4.5 percent of Australian, 16 years and older LGBTI, plus over 900,000 people. Now, you might say, isn't that lower? But I think the critical factor comes in where it says, you know, sort of that the figure for younger people is much higher and that at that figures up at around nine percent. And I think therein lies the, the the rub because you know, the what you know, older people, the stats, the numbers dropped down as we go through the age cohorts, which there's a very simple logical explanation that older people have faced more discrimination heard. More negativity seen felt more negativity which ever since you want to want to, you sort of use there and perhaps a less likely to disclose things be out, be trusting, all those sorts of things.

And I think that, once we start looking at that way that had they not older, people not had to endure. That had said, people, you know, sort of being able to be more out. We'd find that a more consistent number across the whole population. So I think that's the first thing that I would sort of coming there is that, you know, the the I think the figure does put things, relatively low overall want to say, put it low, it is what it is. I'm not denying that but I think that, you know, better here in a better world and more Ideal World, whatever you want to call it. We would have more people disclosing and it would be a lot higher.

So I think this is good news on a number of levels. First of all, that we have the stats because we haven't had this bigger comprehensive nationwide survey before in that there's been very good Victorian state surveys, which do come up with similar risk numbers overall, and the exact figure for people in the 16 to 25 year old bracket 16 to 24 bracket is 9.5%, you've then got 25 to 34 year old 7.5%, and then it drops to between one and a half. And four percent between the remaining age cohorts, with 1.4 percent of 75 plus has identified as one or more of LGBTI+ to use the language of this survey. So I think there's definitely something to be said there that in sort of in what is going on. That certainly there's a lot more sort of, you know, people who probably will not disclosing not able to be themselves.

If not, I will say either unwilling and or unable to be themselves and then we drill into the survey even more in terms of sexual orientation. 43% using gay lesbian 46% using bisexual and 11% using a different term asexual or pansexual. If we trust talking sexual / sexual orientation to use the language of this survey, which really has to put an en to bi+-erasure. And anyone who still has those views who's not bisexual I think really has to have a look at themself and there is no excuse now, for not having more by specific policy and programs and by run by specific programs run by by plus organizations declaring. Any possible interest as a Committee Member of what is now Bi Plus Pride Victoria formerly known as Bisexual Alliance Victoria, which is merging with Melbourne Bisexual Network. And this is something that bi+ people though have campaigned for for a long time to just get on the board and I don't know how the 11% breaks down in terms of asexual pansexual and all the term valid terms involved. But if we even to assume I think reasonably three or four percent, we're close to half of the rainbow in terms of sexual orientation is multi-gender attracted.

To the T of interest to me, .9 of 1% trans or gender diverse. Now, of course, we don't know about overlap here and intersectionality is one factor that we don't know about, which may keep the figures overall a bit lower. And then point three percent born with variations of sex characteristics. Now I'm think again, the trance percentage could be higher again, we know if the sadly of the current climate in around the world and to some extent, Australia so-called Australia with what is going on against trans people and point three percent of one percent with intersects, which sort of goes against the long-held estimates of around 1.7 percent. But again, who, how many people are disclosing is the data collection the best. It could be all these lots of things need to be considered and in terms of intersectionality with a hammer, I haven't got my calculator at hand but three and four non-binary people under the T. If we're saying trans being trans, gender diverse non-binary plus, three point, three and 75% of non-binary is LGBTQ+ fit compared to 15% of trans men, 21% of trans women, 3 percent of cis men 4% of cis women. So that I think that shows something that I've bet we've been saying for years, that tran the T in the be are the binary Buster's in so many ways. It says here that LGBTIQ+ people more likely to live in metros than regional and remote.

Again I wonder if that's safety factors in people feel people feeling unsafe to disclose more likely to be born in Australia 21% born overseas, which I think is parallel to the population overall 5%, speak a language other than English gender diversity. This was of interest in that, we're close to the proverbial Kaleidoscope. We've always sort of said existed 33% non-binary slightly more trans men than trans women is their male privilege, in a sense going on there. Of course transmitted and every person needs to be themself but is it easier to sort of go down the trans men path than the trans women path younger people. Again, more likely to identify in this area and the ABS did Health surveys to focus on this. Just how they got there, but it's not a census as such but it's still pretty big relevant data. And I think you know it's just shows again the silliness and the travesty that was the debate that happened in the mid year on.

Census and how we had to struggle to get sexual orientation and gender identity. And it should be added that this is only 16 plus, which doesn't really talk about, you know, sort of where we're going with the younger people. It would be very interesting if there was a way to somehow say that was all.

You know, sort of dots eyes dotted and T's crossed. And I'm not talking you to sex and trans, but we are talking all of lgbti not just int. How could we find out about young people? Because there's lots of implications for health, first, and foremost for basic well-being, but also, I think there's some political implications here. And yeah, the fabulous Jenny's come in with a good question, which I also know

Bring up an interesting survey. Optimistic Melbourne beats Sydney, with numbers of people who identify as queer, thoughts. And why is this the case and wishing you happy holidays? To or first of all, happy holidays to you and everyone back at sure. If those youngish people say. But I think that I have an answer. It's to why Melbourne and also a Victoria and to be fair full credits, the ACT have gone ahead is I think that the generally more Progressive and more inclusive of BTIQA+ then, the more conservative often sort of corporate top-down Sydney, which seems to be relatively behind. I mean, it's great this year that New South Wales, finally caught up a lot of its anti-discrimination laws. So that overall, the eight states and territories are now relatively even on critical laws, but they have been behind for a long time. So I think that's one Ttheory.

The other is that which I've held onto for some time is that one of them also successful jurisdictions in Australia is Tasmania. I think it's the combination of in a seat and Tasmania smaller population. Makes it easy to reach and know people even smaller geographic, areas and Victoria which would probably be one of the three. Smallest geographic areas of the eight states and territories sure we've got the second biggest population, but it's still not too far to travel. You can hello to Mildura and Mallacoota, but you can pretty much get to most of Victoria within about three hours on a road. And, you know, sort of what is it? Six to eight hours. If you're heading to Mildura, or Mallacoota, give or take up or down with the appropriate rest stops, and please drive safely and use the road safely over the holiday season, everyone.

So I think it's the combination of smaller area, smaller relatively small, populations and Progressive governments. And the fact the Tasmania which has succeeded in getting reforms through under even, when they had their has been the Liberals have been the largest party in the lower house. I think might be a part of that Journey. So heaven forbid logic one of these novel concepts in this day and age, but I'll try it anyway. So yeah, there's my thoughts and I'm going to I'll see if I can get, Jessi Ryan on the line once again. If not, I'll talk more about this because it's a good bit of good news to end the year

So let's continue on with this situation of what's going on with the Australian Bureau of Statistics stats. What let's we could crunch numbers all day. Yeah sort of let's just one other sort of state-by-state period, and I think Western Australia was a little lower than the average and that's concerning given the large geographical area. The isolation type of issues could be a fact, would be a factor there, but again, this gives us a row, you know, the bit of a road map, at least on where

we need to go, but what are the implications of this? Well, there's one that we know if there are sort of, if we start really

Crunching, all the numbers and looking at which states and territories are down in which of Igbtq. And I where there's variations, you know, sort of, you know where that's going on. But it also want to point out that in terms of just this survey 20% of people identify as transgender diverse non-binary, so that's not the whole population of so-called Australia. That's the number of survey participants which is still pretty high and seven percent of the survey numbers experience intersex or born with variation of sex characteristics and I think that there's some gaps. It also shows issues for seniors and middle cohort that we've still got such low percentages, that drop from 25.

Thirty-five-year-old 7.5% disguising way down to 3.9 percent. And in my cohort, the 55 to 64 2.3, then it keeps getting smaller. And the ACT per capita has 5.7 percent of the population, wa the smallest per capita, of course, not absolute numbers, but allowing for the smaller populations places like the Northern Territory.

Rhetoric. So you know things to work on there and it's also noted that the Australian Figures were similar to 2023. New Zealand census data in terms of sexual orientation, slightly New Zealand, slightly lower on trans. But as I say there's health and policy implications but what about other political implications?

This will, If instead of it is this figure of nine percent Youth, and four and a half percent of the population. That's and our families and supporters if lgbtiq a plus, is an issue. Can we make if it isn't can't, we make it one because there's got to be some clout to swing some seats there. And I think that's something that political parties are going to have to note and risk of being little cynic sounding cynical.

Maybe this is why, you know, there's an underlying factor in terms of the recently applied social media ban that younger people are feeling more independent. I will have to turn them back to traditional media, that's more conservative and generally speaking more less supportive will say of lgbtiq a plus. Hmm, can't help being a little force, a thoughtful and that one. But parties are going to have to listen and if they don't now get off their Bunsies now, they can the two larger parties at particularly, the national level I won't speak for every state and territory here. They cannot keep losing voters and so they're going to have to start doing more and doing better. And not being so well week on these issues and poor quality and throwing us under the bus, particularly trans and intersex because the there isn't enough to just and the

Recently released LGBTIQA plus health plan, which was released last week, which is a nice document that it's full of warm and fuzzy statements. No strategies, no Targets in terms of numerical and declaring the interest again, on the Committee Member of just equal Australia, which was critical of that and interested to see a lot of large National, but non-lgbtq specific bodies emerged this week supporting the plan has have has endured

And to quote another radio presenter on another station years ago. Have we hit a nerd or a nerve or something? I think there's something going on there and it's not good enough. We, we don't need plans anymore, we don't need research. We've got plenty of national research. And to just When people's, I will do research, it's a way of kicking the can down the road. I'll, but we're speaking seen to do something and I really have a huge problem with that with that plan, personally, speaking, as an individual,

On that front that we need more than that and this is just playing maybe it's playing to Queensland voters or something. Maybe it's don't scare the horses. I mean I'm not going to predict a federal election result, but from what I hear, every sort of Polly's saying the likely outcome of the federal election is a hung Parliament, more likely with labor as the largest of the large of the two larger parties and that also leads to political implications, whilst I believe that a large part of the Cross, Brent, current crossbench in the lower house is supportive of Igbtqa+, particularly greens, and climate change. 200 comment letter. Commonly referred to as teals, you know, why are we working on this? Here's our chance.

So there's plenty of implications of all of this whilst the primary issue is Health well-being and life certainly we need some sort of to have a strategy so to speak and you know sort of get get get cracking then I

mean there is a federal election. Do most likely in the first half of next year and all this information together, we have to really push hard.

Now, I know a few weeks ago, people were saying the, you know, the results in the United States will obviously have some flow through here. Yes, they will. We can I just say? I think we can try to be proactive and assertive as opposed to aggressive and counter. That welcome, everyone's thoughts on that. And we do have some messages in. As I remember to check my SMS line roving reporter has misjudged in a few times. We're more open to queer people in Melbourne. Especially amongst Elite institutions like the ngv whether it's more, queer representation. There we have openly, queer politicians like Harriet Shing and Steve Demopolis Etc. Teenage queer events. Run by -18 at the National Gallery. Representation is key. Yes what is it? You can't be what you can't see. And sadly politicians like macron. Who is just exposed for a sexist and homophobic. Remarks are really disappointing

Yeah, going overseas to France there there look, I think that we have done relatively well in Victoria, we got moving throughout the 2000s and the first part of the 2010s while there was a chance and got a lot of things on the board and have largely locked them in obviously, I suppose that lead someone will probably ask this, so I'll try to be intuitive implications of the more redeeming outcome of a week ago. They still talk.

Talk in the papers about John Pescutto's leadership being under threat and what would that mean for state politics in Victoria? As you do is a moderate overall, he's tried to kill. He's taken a better line than a lot of state and federal liberal leaders on Rainbow issues of the Victorian state to be precise and federal leaders and any change in leadership to my amateur knowledge, would likely be more conservative, but whether that would make a difference, you know, whether the is it, the liberal party that's on the nose, or is it the L? Well, there's a lot of focus on leadership, nowadays, you know, and, of course, we're two years away from a state election, a lot in nineteen ninety percent, ninety eight percent probability, given our fixed terms November 2026. So anything could happen on any side of politics there. Which of course, is not my province. But the thing is yet, we are generally doing well in Victoria, we need to remember that, but it's also a, the fact that Victoria has got a head I think, is something that we need to sort of say, hey, if Victoria can do it, is it really that different anywhere else?

Despite what perceptions you know, I mentioned the Queensland problem or other community latest refer to sometimes the Western Sydney is problem and these my there may be less support, but do you drag down the whole nation or in an at terms of national politics? Just for that, I'm not sure what the answer is in the meantime. Let's have some more musics and follow plus. I haven't played this track for a while. And so that would be my answer to that one in a more general sense of can trans people have any influence, the obvious interest that I have in your question as written in is as a founder of transgender Victoria just declaring that interest John Pescutto well comments, there about his leadership. After the whole more daring deeming situation and you know, sort of is the state Liberal Party divided. Well, that's a fair question there. Obviously is division. He, you know, look, I know. I've got to be careful about what I say.
